- Laxity




Case 1

- Painful lateral side, unstable









Treatment:

- REAL bicompartmental OA
- Medial meniscectomy long time ago
- AND: PF OA (patellar fracture long time ago)


• SO: UNI OA X2








CASE 4: Mr X: 90 y







Conclusions:

- Surgery depening on OA, few PF OA are symptomatic
- Depending on the patients expectations
- If painful unicompartmental TF OA: UNI
- If Bicompartmental OA... Almost total OA= Total knee replacement!
